



WATER TREATMENT PLANT UPGRADE PROJECT

The upgrades at the Water Treatment Plant are progressing as planned. Town Council, with the assistance of a grant, approved the replacement of the service distribution pumps and the main water distribution supply line. The Water Treatment Plant Advisory Committee in 2020, completed recommendations for consideration by Town Council; with special thanks to Glen Lantz and Lyle Knight, who provided important expertise and historical data.

The service distribution pumps were identified to be replaced in a Waterworks Assessment Report completed by Walker Projects. The Waterworks Assessment Report has been a requirement of the Town's Permit to Operate.

In addition to the service pump replacements, the Town installed a 6" water meter in-line to capture the amount of water being distributed throughout the Town. Backup fire flow was also a consideration, as the Town will be refurbishing and reusing one of the service pumps for manual engagement in the event of a fire emergency.

On August 31, 2021, the Town completed the crossover to the revised system. We want to sincerely thank all Town Residents for their patience and understanding while the water distribution system was down. The next steps will include programming for the new pumps and calibration of the monitoring points in the water system.

The Precautionary Drinking Water Advisory remains in effect, until such time that 2 sets of 3 samples, taken 24 hours apart are analyzed and results are accepted. The first set of samples are anticipated to be collected on September 1.

Dear Waterworks Owner/Operator,

This letter is to advise you that a **Precautionary Drinking Water Advisory (PDWA)** will be placed on the residents and users of the **Town of St. Walburg's treated water distribution system**, and is **effective August 17, 2021 @ 9:00 am** until further notice.

The Water Security Agency's protocol is to place systems under a PDWA **due to a depressurization required for upgrades to the treated water distribution system**. This Precautionary Drinking Water Advisory will remain in effect until the safety of the Town's water supply can be ensured at all times. **Therefore, the administration notify all affected users of the distribution system of the conditions attached to this advisory.**

The following conditions will need to be met prior to the removal of the Precautionary Drinking Water Advisory:

- 1) The upgrade work is completed, and the distribution system is re-pressurized, flushed, and disinfected to applicable standards.
- 2) Chlorine and turbidity values are stable and within regulatory limits at the water treatment plant and throughout the distribution system.
- 3) The receipt of two (2) consecutive sets of three (3) bacteriological samples (marked as 'other'), along with chlorine and turbidity values, which show negative results for bacteriological growth in the final treated potable water being supplied. The two sets of samples should be taken at least 24 hours apart from representative areas of the affected portion of the distribution system.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS OCTOBER 3RD-9TH, 2021

Escape Planning

Plan Ahead! If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.



SAFETY TIPS

- » MAKE a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- » KNOW at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.
- » HAVE an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- » PRACTICE your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
- » PRACTICE using different ways out.
- » TEACH children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- » CLOSE doors behind you as you leave.

IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

- » If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- » If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
- » CALL the fire department from outside your home.

FACTS

- 1 A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- 1 According to an NFPA survey, only one of every three American households have actually developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.
- 1 While 71% of Americans have an escape plan in case of a fire, only 47% of those have practiced it.
- 1 One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is often less. And only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety



Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Some tips:

- ✓ Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- ✓ Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- ✓ Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

Hear a Beep, Get On Your Feet!

Get out and stay out! Call 9-1-1 from outside.



Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old. If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!
