The _____ Family's Home Safety Action Plan

ACTION #1

Make the first Saturday of each month "Smoke Alarm Saturday"!

A working smoke alarm will clue you in that there is a fire and you need to escape. Fire moves fast. You and your family could have only minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds.

- Smoke alarms should be installed in every sleeping room, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Test all of your smoke alarms by pushing the test button. If it makes a loud beep, beep, beep sound, you know it's working. If there is no sound or the sound is low, it's time to replace the battery. If the smoke alarm is older than 10 years old, you need to replace the whole unit.
- If your smoke alarm makes a "chirp," that means it needs a new battery. Change the battery right away.
- Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound of the alarm and what to do when it sounds. (See ACTION #2.)

ACTION #2

Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it at least twice a year!

Having a home fire escape plan will make sure everyone knows what to do when the smoke alarm sounds so they can get out safely.

- Draw a map of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors.
- Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure they are part of the plan.
- Make sure all escape routes are clear and that doors and windows open easily.
- Pick an outside meeting place (something permanent like a neighbor's house, a light post, mailbox, or stop sign) that is a safe distance in front of your home where everyone can meet.
- Everyone in the home should know the fire department's emergency number and how to call once they are safely outside.
- Practice! Practice! Practice! Practice day and nighttime home fire drills. Share your home escape plans with overnight guests.

REMEMBER:

When You Hear a Beep, Get On Your Feet!

Get out and stay out. Call 9-1-1 from your outside meeting place.

Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire alarm if it is older than 10 years old. If you don't remember how old it is, replace it.



IMPORTANCE OF FIRE PREVENTION

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

BARKING DOGS A PUBLIC NUISANCE

Even the most enthusiastic dog lovers among us become aggravated if a neighbor's dog barks continually. The constant yapping can disrupt sleep, ruin your time in the yard and generally become an on-going nuisance.

Dogs may bark excessively for a number of reason, including boredom, excitement, and separation anxiety.

When barking becomes excessive, a solution is necessary. There are several ways to accomplish this: a bark collar; establish behaviors, remove triggers, teach commands or spend time with your dog taking him on long walks or playing fetch to burn off energy. Be a responsible pet owner and neighbour and try to eliminate excessive barking.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

- Never ever go trick-or-treating alone.
- Never go inside a house—accept treats only at the door.
- Don't eat candy until you get home , and be sure your parents check your candy before you eat it.
- Everybody should wear a highly-visible or reflective costume and carry a flashlight or glow stick.
- Stay on sidewalks.
- Only visit houses with porch lights on.
- Watch for our local hero's, the St. Walburg Fire and Rescue volunteers, as they will be keeping our ghosts and goblins safe.
- Check Public Health Orders prior to Halloween to see if any changes.



CIVIC ADDRESS & EMERGENCY RESPONSE

WestMed Paramedics would like stress the importance of having civic addresses displayed on all properties in town. Responding to emergencies, within the town of St. Walburg, would benefit greatly by having all the streets clearly marked and numbers clearly displayed on the buildings or properties. Ideally the numbers would be displayed beside the main entrance of a building or residence, but more importantly, the numbers should be visible from the street. If they are not on a building it should be clear as to which property is represented. Displaying your address will result in a more efficient dispatch system and faster response times should an emergency occur. The Ambulance is dispatched out of Saskatoon and many of our paramedics are not local so they are unfamiliar with our town or the area. This means we have to rely on dispatch in order to find our emergencies. Please help us find you when seconds matter and display an address on your properties. Thankyou.
